

Pastoral Letter

If it weren't for a calendar telling me otherwise, I'd say that the Christmas season ended only a week or two ago, and New Year's was practically yesterday. Truth be told, the Grimm family Christmas tree stood strong all the way up to last week. Nevertheless, personal feelings aside, it's now my pastoral duty to alert you: the season of Lent is coming and nearly upon us. The time to prepare is now.

I wonder if that sounds like a warning to you. Lent can feel as if playtime is over, the holiday has ended; it's time to cut the humor, get serious, and get to work. The season begins under the banner of ashes, as if the fire has died—Ash Wednesday. We reacclimate our tongues to pronounce uncommon words: penance, disciplines, solemnity, holiness, mortality, and repentance. It all can sound rather somber and serious, can't it?

But what if this year we approach Lent like an invitation for renewal? Listen to this story from theologian Julie Canlis, writing in the magazine *Christianity Today*.

When I hit a desert season in my spiritual life some years ago, I felt haunted by the abundance I had left behind. I missed about 10 years of sermons due to pregnancy nausea, crying babies, toddler tantrums, dirty diapers that needed changing right in the middle of the service, or my own human sin. (At least I thought it was sin, but it was more likely total and complete exhaustion.) I was a frazzled mother who brought my children to church in their pajamas and often felt disconnected from Christ there and everywhere else.

At the time, I thought my spiritual dry spell simply reflected how poorly I was doing and how undisciplined I felt in the chaos of parenting young kids. I believed that my faith could only grow in abundance—the abundance of felt worship, prayerful focus, and passionate commitment. But I was wrong. It took me years to learn that the Lord speaks in silence. And years again to learn that he holds onto me more tightly than I hold onto him. And still more years to realize that grace is best understood in periods of apparent failure, absence, and desolation.

As I look back on those desert years, I see that hard-won truth for what it is—a Lenten lesson. Although we often think of Lent as a time of strict discipline and self-denial, it requires something much more: a deep understanding of our belovedness.

We'll enter Lent together on Ash Wednesday, February 14th, with worship at 7pm. Every journey requires preparation, so you might begin thinking now: how can you meet God this season not only in abundance but especially in failure, absence, and desolation? How might you simplify your life by pulling back just a bit on the perfectionism and high expectations? What are the small, doable practices that might allow you to better hear and rest in that voice that calls you beloved?

We'll prepare as best we can, yet the gift of Lent is its truth that we're never prepared enough, never disciplined or devoted or holy enough, yet grace abounds. Being renewed in Christ's transforming mercy and love—that's something worth looking forward to.

During Lent Pastors Tommy and Kelley will lead Faith Forum in the study through the Lenten scriptures.


IU Organists' ChoralFest - Feb 2nd




Playing the Piano for Pleasure

Celebrating Christ and Christmas in Posoltega, Nicaragua!





Thank you for your generous support of the FPC Equal Exchange Coffee Cart this past Christmas and throughout 2023!



As most of you know, Equal Exchange fairly traded coffee, tea, and chocolate products are made available one Sunday each month at the FPC Coffee Cart (generally set up in Lyman Hall after worship). Members and friends are given the opportunity to buy products that are organic and sustainably grown by small-scale farmers from around the world. The farmers are better able to provide for their families, improve their communities, and care for our planet.

In addition, the profits from the coffee cart go toward our mission in Posoltega, Nicaragua. Our profits in 2023 were

\$2,084, with sales of \$5,798 (FPC & law school) minus \$3,714 of Equal Exchange costs.

That Posoltega mission is a continuing all-year project, with basic support from the Outreach portion of the budget for the congregation of the Jesus of Nazareth Parish and its music school program for children. There are other expenses that are not covered by the budget and that the

coffee cart profits help cover, including Western Union fees, additional support for the parish, and the costs of instrument repair and special performances by the music school.

The coffee cart funds are especially crucial when our church sends a delegation to Posoltega. In 2023, coffee cart funds were used to pay for all the groceries and our two cooks throughout the 12-day trip; to pay for hotel rooms and meals for mission trip participants near the Managua airport at the start




and end of the trip; and to pay for a bus trip to the beach to thank all of our kind hosts for opening their homes to us during our stay.

Financial Status & Budget Update

To keep the congregation well informed, here is a brief financial update and a celebration regarding the results of the 2024 generosity campaign.

Thanks to your generosity, we received significantly more in December than we spent and came much closer to meeting our 2023 budget than we had projected. Unfortunately, we finished the year with an \$18,379 deficit after a surplus in 2022. This is not ideal; however we're happy to report that the church fulfilled all of our outreach commitments to partner non-profits in 2023. We are working to better clarify the church's ongoing costs and needs in order that ministries can spend funds confidently and congregants can give generously and knowledgeably.

FPC is starting 2024 significantly stronger with early pledges to the general fund totaling \$430,000, which is 71% of the budget and is an increase over last year. Your contributions are what make it possible for us to celebrate Christ and to continue serving both the local and the larger community. We are grateful for your broad-based support both in the rising number of pledges received and the annual increases that those pledges represent. We're excited about the congregation's journey toward even greater financial health and maturity.
